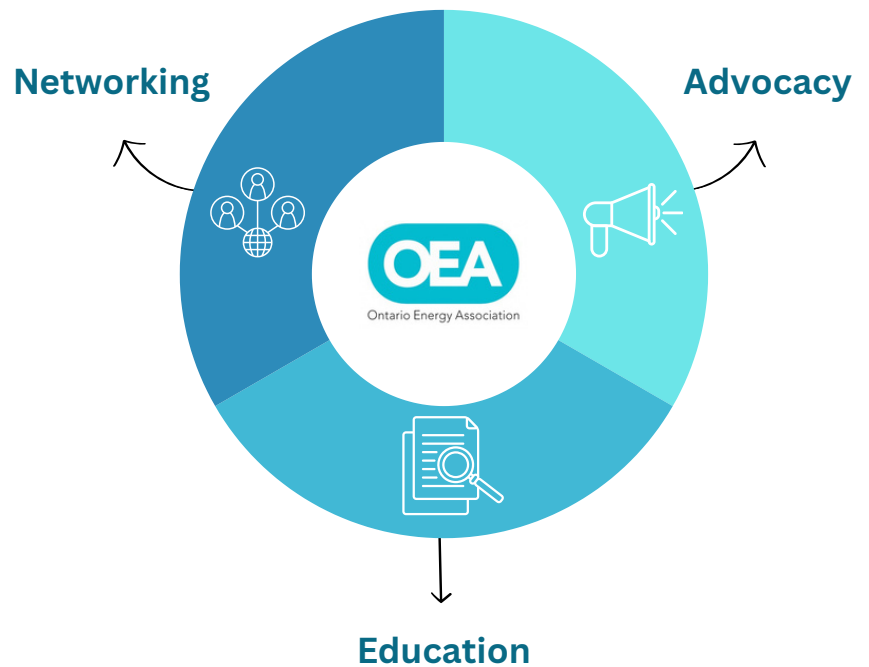

The OEA plays an integral part of energy policy development and decision making in Ontario on behalf of our members. Over the past year, the OEA has actively represented members on a variety of issues through submissions, participation in consultations, legislative hearings, and direct advocacy, including the following example issues:

## **IESO Local Generation Program (LGP)**

The IESO has been directed by the government to establish a local generation program to re-contract existing and secure new-build small-scale electricity generation resources that are connected to the distribution system. The OEA is very supportive of the government's initiative to promote greater utilization of DERs to meet system needs. Across Ontario, there are over 2,000 generation facilities contracted with the IESO within LDC service territories, with approximately 1,600 contracts set to expire over the next decade. To ensure continued value from these distributed energy resource (DER) assets, the IESO is exploring the establishment of the Local Generation Program (LGP) to secure existing and new distribution-connected generation facilities. The OEA and EDA has formed a joint working group and continues to work with the IESO to represent the interests of its LDC and DER community members.

## **DSO Consultation and Local Flexibility Markets Project**

The OEA has a working group of Ontario's largest LDCs to promote the utilization of Local Flexibility Markets (LFMs) to optimize Ontario's electricity grid from the bottom up through the integration of Distributed Energy Resources (DERs). The objective of this work is to provide access to the full value stack for distribution connected DERs, and provide a common customer experience with LDCs acting as neutral market facilitators. The OEA has been actively promoting greater DER utilization and opportunity in Ontario as one of the most cost-effective ways to help meet growing energy needs.

## **Integrated Energy Plan**

An Integrated Energy Plan (IEP) has been a multi-year focus of the OEA for the government to introduce a long-term planning framework for the province's energy sector. An IEP allows for asset growth and investments to be considered on a holistic basis while providing planning stability and certainty for energy sector stakeholders. The Minister of Energy announced a commitment to an IEP in late 2024, for initial implementation in 2025. This file remains a key priority for the OEA and its members, and will be a focal point for ongoing advocacy work.

## **Electricity Demand-Side Management (eDSM)**

eDSM (formerly referred to as CDM) is a significant success for the OEA and its industry partners, securing a long-term funding commitment from the government. The government has committed almost 11 billion dollars for eDSM activities over a 12-year period. The funding commitment comes on the back of two years' of advocacy work by the EDA, its members and other industry stakeholders. It is estimated that every dollar of eDSM funding will offset 2 dollars of future infrastructure spending, saving ratepayers and taxpayers over 10 billion in additional capital costs. The OEA is supporting ongoing activity to reduce regulatory burden for LDCs trying to develop local eDSM programs.

# OEA COMMITTEES & WORKING GROUPS

OEA committees and working groups meet throughout the year to engage on a variety of sector topics and establish policy positions to present to government and regulators. Participating in OEA committees and working groups means being part of the innovation and collaboration behind our advocacy. Our committees and working groups are voluntary and open to all members who wish to join throughout 2026, additional committees or working groups may be added as issues arise of interest to the membership.

## ENERGY STRATEGY COMMITTEE

The Energy Strategy Committee provides a forum for members to discuss and shape high-level, forward-looking issues affecting Ontario's energy sector. The committee focuses on issues such as affordability, system planning, climate objectives, innovation, and emerging policy trends, complementing regulatory discussions without duplicating them. Its role is to support strategic alignment, share insights, and inform OEA advocacy and engagement priorities.

## REGULATORY COMMITTEE

The Regulatory committee considers the broader regulatory implications of electricity and gas sectors arising from generic proceedings, decision documents, government announcements, policy documents and other relevant sources. The committee will identify regulatory issues and, develop public policy and advocacy positions for the OEA related to these.

## EVENTS COMMITTEE

The Events Committee takes on the role of advising the Ontario Energy Association on their annual events offerings. The committee provides new suggestions and recommendations to the OEA, to further expand the OEA's annual events such as the Ontario Energy Conference, Speaker Series and other events that may be of interest to OEA members.





## OEA SPEAKER SERIES

The **OEA Speaker Series and Webinars** are some of the sector's most popular and effective forums, addressing issues that matter most to the energy sector. These events feature current and emerging leaders, decision-makers and innovators from across Ontario and other jurisdictions.



## ENERGY CONFERENCE & AWARDS

The **Ontario Energy Conference**, in partnership with the Association of Power Producers of Ontario (APPRO), is a forum to discuss and debate the critical issues on the minds of the industry and government. Speakers range from politicians, to industry experts, to global thought leaders who discuss the impact of legislative and regulatory policy, innovation, and the politics in the realm of energy.

In conjunction with our annual conference, the OEA recognizes its members' achievements with the **Energy Awards**. This celebration brings the sector together for an evening of recognition and inspirational speakers.

Smaller companies engaged in the distribution or transmission of energy and smaller-scale generation capacity, as well as energy marketers, retailers and other market participants.

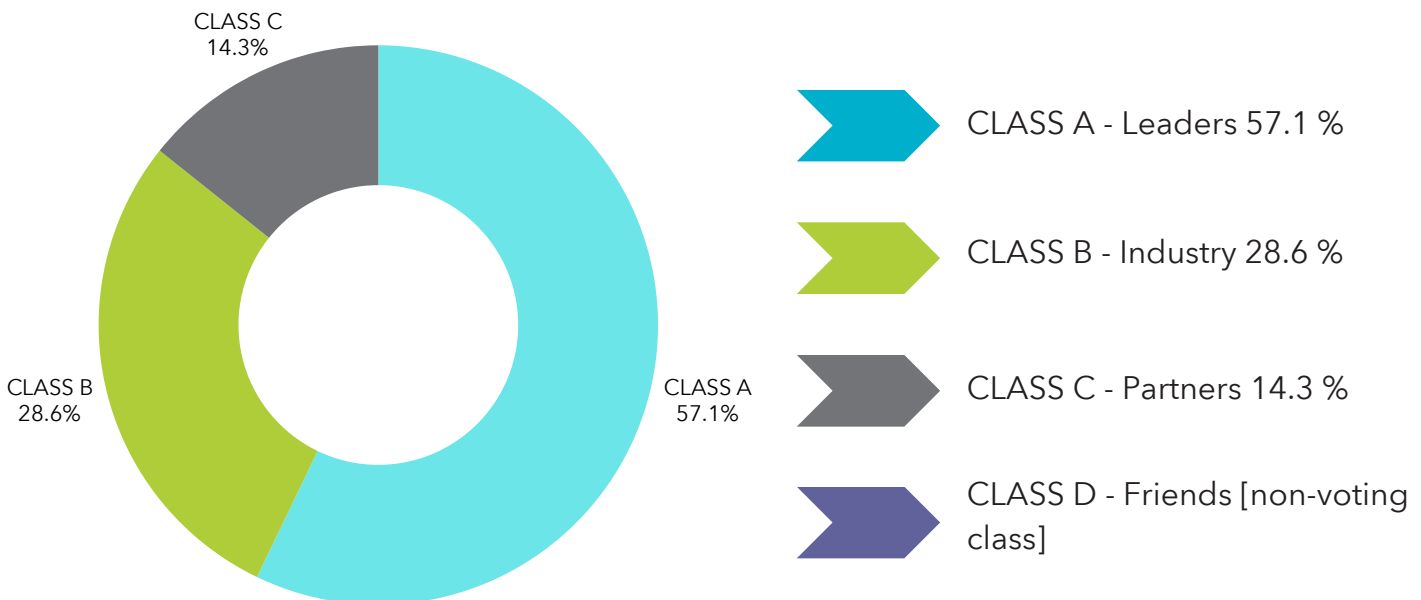
## CLASS C - PARTNERS
